PASTOR'S PASSAGE

Although I will be at home recovering from my second knee surgery on the first Sunday of October, I've been thinking about the privilege of being an ordained minister and consecrating the elements of the Sacrament of Holy Communion. I miss it when I am not there. Every special event in my life as a pastor, whether ordination, or installation at a new church, or any special anniversary has always been celebrated by including the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

Yet, I often wonder if Christians realize how closely this Sacrament is linked to the Jewish customs of Yom Kippur and Rash Hashanah, both times in the year when the examination of self and the intention to be a better person are involved in their daily lives. There is a prayer during these times called Ashamanu, the recitation of sins, that is very

similar to the Christian prayer of confession that we say each time we share the Sacrament. The recitation is this:

- Ashamanu – we have been guilty*
- Bagadnu – We have betrayed (as a person strikes a fist to his/her chest)*
- Gazalnu – we have stolen*
- Dibarnu dofi – we have lied*
- Niatznu – We have been scornful*
- Saranu – We have been disobedient*
- Ta' inu – We have gone astray*
- Ti' tanu – We have misled others*
- Sarnu – We have turned away from you*

Each person then asks to be inscribed in the Book of Life for another year and says: Pardon us, pardon us, grant us atonement. Amen.

While we want to know that we are loved and forgiven, it is this tradition that leads us to a prayer of confession where we understand our failings and promise God that as best we are able, we will do better to live up to God's expectations of us as individuals and as a Church.

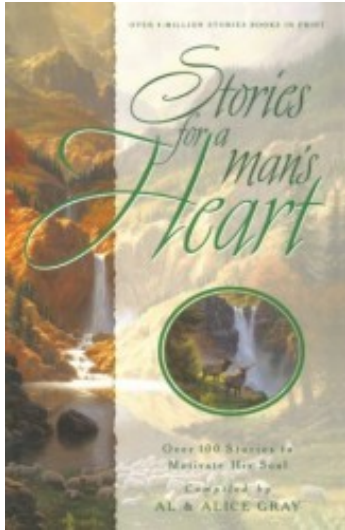
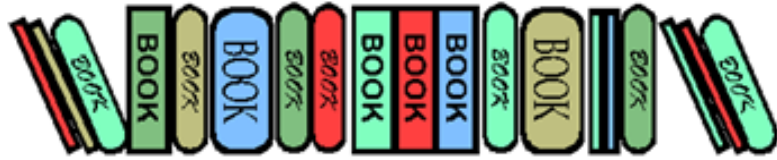

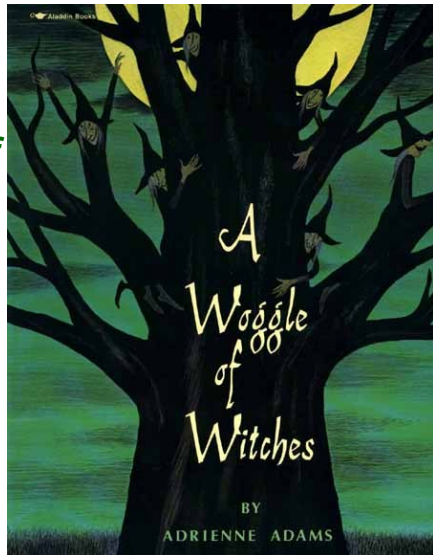
FROM YOUR LIBRARY COMMITTEE...

- ◆ The 35th Annual Greater Lansing CROP Hunger Walk is on Sunday, October 9. Join Suzy Merchant, Head Coach of MSU Women's B'Ball and Honorary Chairperson and walk to stop hunger. Registration is at 1pm at Dwight Rich Middle School, with the 10K walk starting at 2pm. Donations go to fight hunger and poverty locally and globally.
- ◆ We are gearing up for Shoebox Ministries The National Collection Week is November 14-21. Use an empty shoebox/plastic box to fill with personal items for a boy or girl, ages 2-4, 5-9 or 10-14. Fill your box with little gifts: school supplies [pens, pencils, sharpeners, crayons, markers, solar calculators], toys [small cars, dolls, balls, mini Etch A Sketch, yo-yos, harmonicas, jump ropes], hygiene items [toothbrush/paste, comb, washcloth, mild bar soap], or other things, such as t-shirts, socks, ball caps, flashlights [with extra batteries], and a personal note if you like. Do not include used/damaged items, war related items or toy weapons, chocolate/food, liquids/lotions, medication or breakables. Please donate \$7 for each shoebox to cover shipping. - ◆ We'll participate in Operation Santa again, working with area social workers to give kids a Christmas they ordinarily wouldn't have. More info to come in the near future.
- ◆ Don't forget the Mitten Tree. New mittens, hats and scarves for the children of Fairview School. Get those knitting needles out!

Fourth, it is my job as an interim to assist the church in discovering the exact number of members and assisting with procedure. In fact, the search committee may later feel they need even more information and actually send out another information form to the congregation as they assemble the church profile. *Finally, it is my job as the Interim Minister to assist with any procedural questions the search committee may have if I can be helpful.* But *I have no part and no knowledge of any candidate*, and have absolutely no input into that process whatsoever once it has begun. My job is to act as your Senior Minister while the work of the committee goes on with absolute confidentiality.

One other question arose this past week concerning my time off from surgery. Although I have a disability clause in my contract that covers up to three months of disability from surgery or accident, I chose not to take vacation or continuing education time this year to allow for time for the surgeries on my knees. Rather than use vacation time and then disability, I chose to gift that time to the church. I felt this was something I could do for the church and also take the time needed for the surgeries.

As I shared with the Council, this is one of the most exciting times in our ministry together. A search committee will shortly be elected by the Church Council and they will begin the work of working with the National Association to finalize our Church Profile and begin to list our Church in the Congregationalist and other periodicals and receive profiles. This is a time for enthusiasm and working together that we might be the Church Christ intends and welcome a new pastor into this glorious historical congregation.

As your Interim I ask for your prayers for the Church, for your church leaders, and especially for those who will be called to the awesome task of discerning the will of God

CHURCH COUNCIL NEWS—OPPORTUNITY AND NEEDS

At the Church Council meeting last week, many issues arose and there was much discussion. That's a very good thing, as Martha Stewart would say. Each Board chair reported on the activities and plans for the future of their board for the Church and it was exciting to listen and place various special events on our calendars.

Some issues needed clarification and that was exactly the right place for bring any issues. There was discussion about the recent Pastoral Trait mailing where each member had an opportunity to choose what they believed to be the twelve most important traits of a new Senior Minister. While some people members shared that they even signed their name so if anyone ever had a question they could be contacted, others felt overwhelmed by the task and didn't return it. That's too bad. This was an opportunity for every member of the church to have personal input. Given all that has happened historically at Plymouth, certainly everyone has some thought as to the traits most important in their future pastor.



But there was another clarification that needed to be made as well. For some reason, several people thought that this form was created by me and objected because I am the Interim Minister and shouldn't be involved. **First, this was a form used by many churches and denominations** – it's just a form that we used to help the search committee prepare the church profile and have a sense of the needs of the congregation. **Second, the number listed on each form was only a control number** to assure that each form received was the one sent to each member. **Third, I have not seen the forms** – they will be collated and given to the search committee.

We are making a commitment to our friends at the Greater Lansing Food Bank. They have put out a call for help after one of their 3 refrigeration trucks was destroyed in a senseless act of vandalism. We are selling water and other refreshments at the Plymouth Concert Series. That \$1 you spend on a bottle of water is going directly to the Food Bank to help defray the costs associated with purchasing another vehicle. Our first concert saw us earning \$100! [the heat is good for SOME things!!!] So, keep coming to the concerts, tell your friends and keep drinking! [the water that is!]

Samaritan's Purse is a constant and quiet presence wherever Christ is needed in our conflicted world. They are asking us to pray. We can do that. They are currently focusing on rebuilding 300 homes in Japan that were flooded but the foundations are intact. They have provided over 3,000 displaced families with household kits.

There are several part time security positions open at the Maplewood Shelter for Women and Children. Candidates must be detail oriented and able to sit or stand for long periods of time. The job entails surveillance of the security cameras, making periodic rounds of the building, and ensuring the safety of those whom the mission serves. Overnight shifts are available on weekdays and day shifts are available on weekends.
